PEMBROKE VOLUME 2 - RANGE WEST

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INTRODUCTION

For so long the 'promised land' of future developments in Pembroke this is the continuation of varied, rugged coastline running westwards from the Stack Rocks car-park at OS Ref. 924 944 to the western limit of the ranges at OS Ref. 886 993 (adjacent to Freshwater West beach). Some of this is very impressive indeed with a similar length of climbable coastline to that in Range East, although generally not as high.

It does however contain the majority of the best easy grade climbing in Pembroke, and much of it non-tidal, don't all crowd Saddle Head, try Bulliber: Centre or Mount Sion East: 40-Foot Wall instead. Below half tide, the extensive cliffs of Bulliber, Funlands and the northern end of Western Walls contain many excellent routes, including the UK classic *Christmas Chasm*, and many others I leave you to find.

In the early years access was somewhat bureaucratic, but many access changes for the good have taken place in the last four years and its reputation is worse than the impact. The briefings are now much shorter and the range signing in procedure simplified. The regulations change from time to time but recent improvements mean:-

- •The Range opens for climbing on the last Saturday of May and closes on last Sunday of January. Climbing can take place at weekends and on Bank Holidays, and at other times when the range is closed (e.g between Chrismas and New Year)
- •Entry is permitted at any time during daylight
- •There is a new access point and (locked) car-park at the north-west end of the range, Gupton Gate OS Ref 894 988 (remember to return the key)

It is strongly recommended that climbers do not jeopardise the agreements. For more up to date information and briefing dates, contact the British Mountaineering Council on 0161 445 4747 (www.thebmc.co.uk) or check the climbing press. The choice of Stack Rocks or Gupton Gate car park is then dictated by the location of the cliff and the active bird restrictions. Gupton Gate is best for the crags north and west of Pen-y-Holt Bay, Stack Rocks for the crags to its east.

The Range is a special place, in that the non-use of pesticides means that it is an unspoilt wildflower meadow, and alive with butterflies in the spring. Choughs are rare, approximately 20 pairs in Pembrokeshire, but in early autumn it is possible to see flocks of many tens of birds on the downs at Linney Head. When accessing from Gupton Gate, climbers must walk below the high tide line, it is much easier on the feet and avoids disturbing the beetles that live in the driftwood. Remember drink cans and plastic bags are far more damaging to the wildlife than the large rusting tanks that litter the landscape.

Range West

It is fervently hoped, by the current active climbers, that this section of coastline continues to be a bastion, perhaps the last, of adventure style climbing. It is therefore, proposed that **no fixed gear** (bolts, pegs or slings) is placed and that every effort is made to reduce the impact of climbers. In particular, a return to the traditional (i.e. old fashioned) notion of on sight, ground-up, ascents of new routes without pre-inspection is also advocated. Efforts such as these will greatly enhance our cause when dealing with the primary user of the land (the military).

Gupton Gate Access Description

From the stile (OS Ref. 89354 98770) out of the car park turn right (OS Ref. 89349 98754) following the tarmac track towards the radar station. Just after a dip (OS Ref. 88973 98770) as Frainslake Beach becomes visible turn left down short grass towards the beach. At a stone platform (OS Ref. 88921 98560) turn left (south) along a path that leads to a shady gully (OS Ref. 88947 98515) that leads down onto the beach. Walk along the beach to the south end where a 5 bar gate (OS Ref. 89068 97656) is protected by large mounds of driftwood. Go through the gate, turn right and follow the sandy track, in places covered in wire mesh as it leads over a headland and turns left. Fork right at a Y-junction (OS Ref. 89121 97396) which is just before a concrete ruin on a small hill. Go down a hill past a concrete and stone bunker and fork left at the next Y junction (OS Ref. 989121 97166) just before a small brick tower. Follow the track to the gate onto the tarmac track (OS Ref. 89183 96972), turn right (west) and follow the track to another gate (OS Ref. 88542 965866), above Berry Slade.

There is a range phone on the gate to the Gupton Gate Radar Station.

The better problems lie at the north end of the beach. Approaching the first group of 74

boulders, set into the hill at the top of the beach, one is fairly encouraged, but these turn 77

out to be extremely friable, and should not be bothered with at all. 81

Further across the boulders some higher rocks are visible and these turn out to be much

more solid, and with undercut bases. These faces are largely excellent, but suffer from

boulder landings (mats are required for most). Much of the rock is so compact as to be 103 nearly holdless.

[b1]The large freestanding boulder in front of the centre of the crags is barnacle encrusted

but is extremely compact and undercut giving a few contrived but good and desperate

115 [b2]Back and left, the rocks are a little cluttered and the landings occasionally appalling.

but there are some really good problems. To the right is an overhanging wave of rock,

consisting of three conjoined faces.

136 [b3] The left-hand of the three faces is excellent. The middle is reasonably good, and the

136 right is again excellent, but mats are required.

[b4] Further right are more faces, but again mats are required.

[b5]Down in front are two freestanding boulders, one larger than the other, with severely

undercut bases, which give good sitting start problems, above large shingle.

Range West - Berry Slade

BERRY SLADE

Approaching from Gupton Gate, access is just past the cattle grid on the tarmac road. From Stack Rocks, 500 metres north of the lookout station at Linney Head, an east/west fence is reached. This fence delineates the limit of MOD freehold and where it touches the coastline, defines the west end of Berry Slade. Pass through the gate in the fence and head towards the selected crag. The descent to Small Buttress Bay is the depression in left front, the top of the black slab in Black Slab Bay straight ahead and UXB Buttress 200 metres to its northeast.

Berry Slade: UXB Buttress

OS Ref. 8846 9703 Approach Time 50 min Aspect North West **Tidal Consideration** Mid tide and lower

Cross the fence at the gate (OS Ref. 88376 96790) and go northeast about 250 metres to the flat top of a buttress. This is directly north of the cattle grid in the road. It is possible to scramble down the east side of the buttress at all states of the tide and down the west side within one-hour of low tide.

Danger UXB 18m HS 4b

About 15 metres northeast of the main buttress is a large cave which used to contain the unexploded "bomb". Climb the pillar right of the cave, traverse 5 metres left on the lip and FA A Tallant, S Howe, S Hind 25.8.02 climb the groove above to the top.

FA N Barry, S Howe 27.7.02

The main crag consists of the large buttress with a right-angled corner in the centre. No Tallant climbs the hanging corners left of this and Post Coital Experience the corner. Right of this is a buttress with a slabby front and undercut right hand side across which Ménage a' Trois traverses.

*No Tallant 27m E2 5b

This route climbs the obvious hanging corners over two roofs at the centre of the crag. Start from the wide crack on the left and traverse to the ledge above the first roof. Climb the crack to the top.

Post Coital Experience 27m HVS 5a

This route climbs the right wall of the corner, right of *No Tallant*. Climb the overhanging wall (crux) and up the continuation corners above.

Climb the slabby ramp/crack right of the overhanging wall, started directly from below. FA N Barry, H Barry, C Williams 28.7.02

To the right is a buttress, above a pool, bounded by two cracks. A prominent crack in the centre starts about 6 metres up.

What the heck! 15m VD

Climb the left hand crack from the pool.

Climb the bulge to the centre crack.

Toil and Strife 15m VD

Climb the right hand crack from the pool

Start as for Toil and Strife, step right and climb the layback crack above the corner of the

*Ménage a 'Trois 27m VD

Start as for *Post Marital Tension* to the corner of the buttress, and then follow the ramp across the face to the right.

On the overhanging face a crack/ramp runs up to the right.

Stag Party 15m HVS 5a

Traverse the lower ramp to beneath an obvious hanging layback crack. Make difficult moves up this and then climb straight up the slabs above crossing Ménage a' Trois.

Boys Day Out 15m HS 4b

Climb the corner just left of where the lower ramp breaches the overhang. Balance right onto the face and climb straight up the slabs, finishing just left of *Ménage a' Trois*. FA N Barry, P Sleet, S Hind 25.8.02

Do You Have To 15m S 4a

Climb the chimney crack, on the right of the overhanging wall to the first big ledge on the right. Step across the void onto a small ledge and climb to the finish of *Ménage a' Trois*. FA N Barry S 25.8.02

The next buttress is very tidal and may not be accessible except on spring tides.

KY Jelly 15m VD

Starting at the base of Anniversary Route, climb up onto the ledge on the left. Climb the oil-covered slab above (slippery when wet) and finish up the headwall. FA N Barry S 25.8.02

Anniversary Route 15m S 4a

Climb the leftward slanting crack/ramp on the front of the buttress.

Marriage! 15m HS 4b

Climb the straight crack in the centre of the buttress.

Climbus Interruptus 15m HVS 5a

From the pool on the right, climb the overhanging pedestal and easy wall above leading to the ledge. Balance up the wall right of Marriage!, place good runners and launch over the roof.

Berry Slade: Hi! Tide Wall

Approach Time 50 min
Aspect Faces North
Tidal Consideration Low tide

About 50 metres southwest of *Climbus Interruptus* the boulder beach is interrupted by a deep pool/gully. On the west side is a clean overhanging wall. This wall may be the ultimate deep-water soloing venue, since it is completely covered at spring tides.

Short But Sweet 9m VS 5b

Start at low spring tide, just above the seaweed. Climb the centre of the overhanging wall via a discontinuous thin crack (runners), to a sloping mantelshelf finish. FA N Barry, P Watson 1.8.04

Berry Slade: Black Slab Bay

OS Ref. 8834 9695

Approach Time 50 min
Aspect Southwest
Tidal Consideration Half tide

The next routes are reached by crossing the fence at a gate (OS Ref. 88376 96790) and heading northeast to the coast (approx. 100 metres) at a cave. There is a large blowhole at the back of some low angled black slabs running into the cave from its southern side. To the left of the slabs is an undercut wall bounded on the right by an open groove, *Poussetoi de la*, and a crack-seamed wall. Scramble down the black slab on the south side of the bay. *Dead Choughed* lies outside the bay and can be reached by scrambling around boulders to the east of the entrance to the bay. It is also possible to descend from the top of the Hi! Tide Wall by an easy 50-metre scramble along the beach of large boulders.

Dead Choughed 27m HVS 5a

Around the east arête of the bay is a small, compact wall with a stepped groove up its centre. Climb this and the wall above, starting from a large sea washed boulder. FA R Jones, H Day, B Davidson 30.8.93

On the northeast side of the bay is the wall containing the remaining routes, which can be easily reached by descending the large black slab, which forms the southwest side of the bay.

Choughed to Bits 23m HVS 4c

Start from the beach at low tide. Climb to the top of the left-to-right ramp line to the left of the prow and finish through the overhang above a large natural thread. FA B Davidson, R Jones, H Day 30.8.93

Edge of Extinction 23m E3 5b

Climb as for *Pousse-toi de la* to the platform. Move easily to the overhanging prow and climb it.

Pousse-toi de la 12m VD

The open groove is bridged to a wide platform on the left. Finish up the groove. FA N Matton, G Lambe 27.9.92

Field Mouse 12m S

Climb as for *Pousse-toi de la* to the platform, then the steep wall just right of the groove. FA G Lambe, N Matton 27.9.92

Low tide Start 2 metres right of the groove of *Pousse-toi de la*. Climb the front of the pedestal, moving left round the arête at the top (or a long step across from the platform of *Pousse-toi de la* (**Hogging It** HS 4b Lambe 27.9.92).

OS Ref. 8826 9680

Approach Time 50 min
Aspect Northwest
Tidal Consideration Mid tide boulder field

The following routes lie to the west of a boulder cove that is directly below the gate in the east-west fence. Access is by an easy scramble down the back corner of the cove, traversing under *Small Buttress*, and onto the higher boulders at the base of the *No Hiding Place* slab.

The Crazy Gang are in Town 36m D

This route climbs the slab starting at the bottom of the scrambling descent, just north of *Small Buttress*. Start from the boulder cove and climb the large slab to the east, in two pitches, but easily done in one.

Festen 20m VS 4c

Start at the toe of the buttress, climb up left onto a ledge and then follow the crack into the shallow sentry box, pull out left and up onto the finishing slab.

Small Buttress 20m D

Climb the right-front face of the buttress, immediately southwest of the cove, finishing up a crack.

Flying Jeeps 24m S 4a

This route is located in the bay between *Small Buttress* and arête of *Dummkopf*. Climb the wall (threads) just right of *Small Buttress* to the left hand corner jam crack. FA N Barry, H Barry 26.8.01

Climb the wall to a crack and then the right hand corner.

Dummkopf 15m S 4a

Climb the left arête of the larger slab, passing a flake ledge and overlap at half height. Easy for the grade if you find the holds!

No Hiding Place 18m S 4a

Climb the discontinuous cracks up the left side of the slab.

Don't Mention the War 18m S 4a

Climb the full height crack just left of centre.

Climb the pocketed slab between the cracks.

Editor's Choice 18m HS 4b

At the right hand end of the No Hiding Place slab is a crack. Step across the bergschrund from a boulder, and climb the crack to a ledge on the right hand arête (and good runners). Step back onto the slab and climb past a large thread to an overhang. Climb directly over this to the top.

Startled German 18m VD

Climb the rugged slab and ramp just to the right. This is just left of an earthy depression that bounds the left-hand side of the main cliff.

False Start 30m VS 4a

Start at the left side of the main cliff itself, access by traversing the bay at low tide. Move right and climb a slabby wall to reach a groove in the left edge of the crag just right of the depression which is unstable at the top. Spare rope(s) will be required to reach the fence. FAF Ramsey, P Littlejohn 9.11.91

WESTERN WALLS

These are the extensive stratified walls running southwards from the fence line to a prominent leaning prow overlooking Wind Bay. This is the best low-grade crag in Pembroke having a large number of quality routes on generally perfect rock with solid finishes. There are large terraces, just exposed even at neap high tides, under the crag. In moderate to high seas these terraces remain awash and waves reach a long way up the cliff. Access is best by abseil, from various terraces above the crag.

Approach Time 50 min North/West Aspect

Tidal Consideration

Exposed Low Tide ledges under *Food for Thought* (Springs further south)

Blockhead 30m HVS †

Thirty metres north of the fence abseil off the north end of the terrace to high tide ledges looking into Small Buttress Bay. Good positions, and is easier than it looks, but great care 1 Descend right (north) into the shallow "quarry" and then down gullies to the cliff top. is needed with perched blocks on pitch 2.

- ledge in the corner.
- 2 15m 4b Climb the left-hand of two diverging grooves to a roof. Move right past big blocks and follow another groove to the top and a thread belay.

North West Passage 24m VS 4b

Start below the left end of a roof at 3 metres. Avoid the roof on its left side, then up a slab to a ledge on the arête. Climb the corner, then step left and finish over a perched block. FA P Donnithorne, M Smith, W Cresswell 18.10.92

Below and left of the end of the fence is a recessed wall between two corners, with a roof, split by three cracks, at one third height. The tidal ledges beneath can be reached by walking north from the central area of the crag at spring low tides or by abseil. Twenty metres left of the recessed wall is a large left-facing corner (Fears and Tears).

Fears and Tears 25m E1 5b

Climb the corner then follow a line leftwards under the overlaps to finish up a short corner on the left.

Food for Thought 22m VS 4c

Six metres right of Fears and Tears is a vague groove. Follow this to a large ledge, pull over the overhang and continue up the shallow groove.

Climb the wide overhanging crack at the left end of the recessed wall. FA B Watson, P Donnithorne 29.12.91

Short and Sharp 22m E2 5c †

Climb the thin left-hand crack.

Traditional Shortie 22m E2 5b †

Climb the central of the three attractive crack-lines, taking the second overhang slightly rightwards.

Western Walls: The Terrace Walls

OS Ref. 8816 9666

Approach Time 50 min West Aspect Tidal Considerations Half to low tide ledges

At mid/low tide ledges appear beneath a narrow, rising ledge with a step in it. The following routes start off these ledges. Approach the routes using one of the descents described below. A yellow marker gives the best point to leave the road. Follow this to the

two red markers on the cliff top (OS Ref 88195 96646).

The crack of *The Sea for Breakfast* is just north of a large block (at the south end) of the 1 15m 4b Trend leftwards around the shallow arête, just above a roof and continue left to a lowest ledge (OS Ref. 88162 96664). This can be hard to find at the first visit, but the large ledge above the *Limonium* overhang should be obvious. This leads to the mid tide ledge between Cat Mafia and The Sea for Breakfast.

> 2 Descend right (north) into the shallow "quarry" and then down the first tier to the larger terrace, going south down this (past a large jammed block) leads to the ledges above the bay containing Urbane Gorilla.

3 Descend left (south) down easy ramps, round the next buttress and south until they end over a square-cut clean bay containing a slab (OS Ref. 88159 96593). This is *Too Hard for Barry Humphrey*.

Soft Options 18m S

Climb the arête of the leaning right-hand corner of the recessed wall.

Caloplaca 15m VD

Start 3 metres right of the arête (of *Soft Option*) and climb straight up on good holds. FA G Lambe, N Matton 18.9.93

Just Under the Fence 15m VD

Start 3 metres left of the pedestal of *Crick*. Follow a crack to broken overlaps and climb between these.

Crick 15m VD

Start below a small pedestal / ledge 3 metres above. Climb onto the pedestal then rightwards past the overlap above.

Pvrrhocorax 15m VD

Start 3 metres right of the pedestal (of *Crick*) and directly above the end of the lower spring tide ledge. Climb the crack, which curves left on the upper part of the wall. FA G Lambe, N Matton 18.9.93

Black and Silver 15m VD

Start 2 metres right of *Pyrrhocorax* and left of a shallow groove capped by a small roof. Climb the wall and steeper rock to the top.

Xanthera 15m VD

Climb the shallow groove to a small roof and go over this at its narrowest point. FA G Lambe. N Matton 18.9.93

Polka 15m HS 4b

Start at a crack in the right side of the scoop left of the arête. Climb the crack and wall above.

Cat Mafia 20m S 4a

Climb the wall right of the arête through grooves and a steeper wall above. FA G Lambe, N Matton 18 9 93

The Sun Rises Too 20m VD

Follow the crack-line up walls and terraces.

The next obvious feature is an overhang 5 metres up and about 5 metres long, above the south end of the low tide ledges.

Ginger Lace 20m VD

Go up to the left end of the overhang then climb walls and terraces above.

Limonium 18m S

Start below the left / centre of the overhang. Climb a crack through the overhang, then easier walls above.

*The Sea for Breakfast 18m VD

Start below an obvious crack running past the right side of the overhang. Climb the crack to the terraces above.

Far From the Madding Crowd 22m D

Follow a series of stepped corners up left and belay on top of the overhang to avoid ropedrag. Finish out right up a shallow stepped corner.

Climb directly up from the start of *Far From the Madding Crowd* to finish up the hanging corner.

The starting ledge continues to descend, before rising up to another bay. The next real feature is a small prow with a ledge containing a large block at 15 metres. Climb the corner to the roof, pull around of the left and go up a corner to finish on the large terrace.

This is the long flat wall, slightly recessed which gives steep juggy climbing much of high quality. South of the north corner is a large block ledge (the first to emerge from the receding tide) at the left end of a long, tilted platform. Above the block is a left leaning stepped corner, now decidedly uninviting as the result of a rockfall which removed the top section of *Christmas Quiche*. There are three places, the highest parts of the ledge system which provide the best locations for access by abseil.

1 Down the bay just north of the end of the wall, there are good blocks above the chimney of *Loitering Within Tent*.

2 From blocks above the 10 metres niche above the centre of the wall. This leads to the high tide ledge under *Bellringer*. Much of this abseil is free (over the roof of *Can't Buy A Thrill*).

3 From blocks above the south corner of the bay to the the ledge, exposed at mid tide, under *Steep and Meaningless*.

A Conflict in Terns 30m HVS 4c

Climbs the area of the rockfall. Start at the base of the juggy wall of *Christmas Quiche* and climb straight up the brittle wall, keeping right at the top to avoid the loose perched blocks.

1 15m - Start on the juggy wall left of the loose corner. Go up the wall to join the corner and follow this to a ledge.

Climb the wall by a faint flake line, then rightwards and up a crack to a big ledge. Finish up the prominent left-facing corner and a short wall.

This is a sizeable, boulder filled bay, complete with non-tidal stack in its centre, some 300 metres east of the lookout station. There is an attractive, but unfortunately restricted, cliff of crack-seamed walls on its east side. According to the latest information, there is no restriction on the back face, the west face or the stack. The buttress opposite the stack can be used as a careful abseil descent; it and the cliff as far as the marker star are slowly collapsing. What Goes Down Must Come Up, 50 metres west of the stack, is the recommended descent (but is tidal). In the autumn, the bay is a favourite nursery for seal pups. While seals are not an endangered species and there is no access restriction, please try to show consideration to the seal pups, by avoiding close approach. Choice of descent can help with this.

Opposite the islet the mainland slab is in three sections, separated by west-facing corners. It is best to leave an abseil rope in place to safeguard the exits which tend to be seriously loose

MOUNT SION EAST

This is the line of cliffs running westward from The Wash and rising above an extensive tidal shelf system. At the eastern end the platform slopes into the cliff and the tide rushes in very fast once the seaward lip has been breached – **you have been warned**. However, the left-hand section, containing most of the routes, is non tidal with easy access along the base of the cliff. **Nevertheless in a big sea this area becomes a very serious place to belay**.

Follow the track westwards until just past the shallow valley leading down to The Wash (approximately 500 metres). A short distance further on a low stonewall can be seen on

the left. From this wall continue 25 metres to the yellow marker, then head straight down to a small, low outcrop concealing a circular hole. A 25-metre abseil through the roof of a large cave leads to slippery ledges just above high tide from where easy walking gains most parts of the crag. Alternatively, the stouter climber may prefer to continue a further 75 metres westward to a large, flat-topped pedestal – an 18-metre abseil down *Intruder* gains the ledges. East of the abseil hole cliff top belays are rare. Abseil points are easy to find on top of 40-Foot Wall (or is that more correctly 12 metre wall?).

Mount Sion East: 40-Foot Wall

Approach Time Aspect **Tidal Considerations**

A non-serious and pleasant place to climb, this is the short wall some 90 metres east of the FA A Holland 4.10.92 deep-sea cave of Juggy Point and 80 metres west of Pedestal approach to the main crag. It is easily located by walking seaward from the yellow marker on the road. Most of the routes rely on flat holds and can be much harder for shorter climbers. At this point the cliff-top terrace is at its widest and a clean platform, free at all states of the tide, lies beneath, running eastwards to just beyond the arête of Route Galore. Pav Off 18m E1 5a/b

Climb the rib immediately right of Active Service.

*Intruder 15m VD

The slabby corner up the left (west) side of the pedestal gives an easy escape route. FA R Anderson, K Spense 14.4.84

Crackhead 22m VS 4c

Start 3 metres right of *Intruder*. Move up and left onto the face and continue trending right then straight up to finish.

Quality of Vision 22m E5 6a †

Climb *The Mark of Quality* for 12 metres until it is possible to traverse airily left to a flake on the front face. Make hard moves up and right to finish on the right arête. FA D Donovan, D Pickford 29.8.04

*The Mark of Quality 22m E3 5c

The bulge and right-facing corner groove in the seaward face of the pedestal 6 metres left of *Behind the Lines*. Climb boldly through the initial bulge slightly leftwards to gain the bottom of the groove (good wires). Climb the groove with increasing difficulty to the top. FA M Hopkins, S Findlay 24.8.91

Pit Bull 15m E3 6a/b (2 rest points) †

1 30m 5b Climb up above the blowholes to reach a small ledge at 9 metres (possible belay). Step up and traverse left between the overhangs, pull into a groove above and move left between the overhangs to pull round onto a wall above the lip. Go up to a niche and pull out of this on the left. Climb the wall trending slightly left to belay on a ledge beside blocks.

2 9m 4c Move left over the blocks and climb up above carefully to reach the top. Thread belay in the stone wall above.

A superb way of tackling the large roofs.

Nine metres left of the narrow chimney of Air Raid, just right of the large overhangs, is a right facing corner sandwiched between the overhangs.

Focal Point 36m E5 †

Takes a crackline about 12 metres right of *Toll of Time*. Gain the crack and follow it to a weakness in the roof. Climb through with difficulty, move up then traverse 3 metres left across a slab under a second roof. Pull through this on big holds, up to a third roof and traverse left to a blocky finish.

Highway Above Seal City 62m E1 †

Abseil from a stake, down the gully to the west of the hanging nose, into the large bay approximately 100 metres west of the Green Bridge lookout. This lies to the about 20 metres east of an old rock scar, and 5 metres west of where the cliff turned west. Keep to the west of the nose when abseiling and it is possible to swing into a good non-tidal ledge between two caves.

- 1 18m 5a Climb the pillar and steeper rock above to a belay just below the roof.
- 2 22m 5a Traverse left until small ledges are reached at the end of the large overhangs (great fossils in the roof).
- 3 22m 5a Move up to the fossils then left again to climb the large slab. FA G Lewis, C Jones 4.10.92

- 1 30m 5b Start by climbing the groove. Steep climbing soon leads to a twin parallel traverse lines, which are followed to ledges way to the right, belay.

Forty metres west of the MOD Range boundary fence is a zawn containing a very distinctive east-facing grey slab. Abseil from a stake (OS Ref. 92284 94442) to a roundish non-tidal ledge.

1 25m 5a Start by climbing up to the left/west of the Seal City cave. Climb up towards the Climb up to the horizontal break and traverse left around a small cave to a rib (possible stance). Now climb the brown groove to the roof, traverse 3 metres left then up a short groove to the top.

On the wall immediately east of the grey slab of Your Grace. Approach by abseil to the large non-tidal ledge close to the right arête. From a groove directly above the ledge, continue easily before keeping somewhat left of the right arête on deteriorating rock, bottling out right to finish.

Thirty metres east of On the Catwalk is an obvious west-facing white wall. Dum-Dum takes a line fairly close to the arête up a blind groove, just right of the obvious crackline. Approach by abseil to a non-tidal ledge close to the arête.

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Dum Dum 30m E1 5b

Climb the right-hand corner for 9 metres. Move left and gain a ledge below the roof. Swing round right and move up and gain the groove and thin crack, moving 11/2 metres right at its top to finish.

2 27m 5c Dramatic climbing on good breaks leads through the 21/2 metre roofs to a corner. This is followed to another roof, which is turned on the right. Follow the groove/weakness slightly leftwards to a very fragile upper wall. Belay rope to top out would be useful. FA T Messiah, I Parnell 12.10.97

[x]Life's Rich Pageant 30m MXS 5a †

Located on the east-facing wall beneath the boundary fence, just inside Range West. Abseil to a comfortable non-tidal ledge, 6 metres from the left-bounding arête, leaving a rope available for a top anchor. Towards the right end of the ledge, take the apparently steep corner to pass the small roof on its right and continue up a loose groove in the same direction. After the crux section at about 24 metres, trend left until a solid slab is finally reached and climbed left-wards, before exiting up the obvious corner above. FA D Wright, F Kenden 5.10.97

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
